THE (DIS)EASE OF SOCIAL MEDIA

Dr. Firasat Jabeen Chairperson and Assistant Professor of Mass Communication Department

Dr. Firasat's presentation explored new media with a focus on peripheral countries. It touched on the influence of figures like Wendy Chan, discussing the social and ethical implications of new media, and guestioned the concept of updating in the digital age. The talk highlighted the distinction between new media and social media. emphasized their ubiquitous nature, and pondered the sense of ownership and dependence on social platforms. It also delved into the complexities of anonymity, particularly in the context of Facebook, and examined the role of repetitions and the shifting value of information in the age of ideologically driven states.







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FROM HEADLINES TO HASHTAGS

Mr Ajmal Jami

Broadcast Journalist, Anchorperson and Social Media Strategist/Trainer

Mr. Ajmal's presentation delved into the world of journalism and the impact of sensationalism, using a wide range of practical examples to illustrate its effects on society. Topics included international leaders like Imran Khan and Trump, the power of social media hashtags. and the influence mainstream media and anchors. The presentation also explored deterioration of political and social behavior, ethical debates, and the role of the state and government in sensational reporting. It shed light on the importance of responsible journalism and the role of democracy in maintaining consistency in media practices.

JOURNALISM IN THE DIGITAL TRENCHES

Prof. Dr. Savera Shami

Chairperson, Department of Digital Media, University of the Punjab

In her exploration of the "Digital Trenches," Dr. Shami delved into online spaces, primarily social media platforms, where vibrant conversations and interactions flourish. Her role as a diligent journalist was essential for upholding accurate reporting and factchecking.

These digital spaces have the potential to foster peace by connecting diverse groups, but they also bring challenges, such as polarization and the formation of echo chambers. A significant concern is the spread of misinformation and information manipulation, which can conflict. Superficial escalate engagement, where users quickly skim content, may lead to distorted views. This discussion underscores the complexities and opportunities at the intersection of journalism and social media within the evolving landscape of the "Digital Trenches."



TO SEE THE WORLD FROM THE OTHER SIDE

Prof. Elisabeth Eide

Professor Emerita, Oslo Metropolitan University, Norway

In a compelling presentation on historical conflict reporting, we ventured from the Crimean War to today, seeking a balanced view of conflicts. We addressed the challenge of maintaining objectivity in an age of sensationalism and clickbait. We highlighted the role of journalists in revealing the realities of conflicts, remaining steadfast in their mission to uncover the truth. They act as bridges, humanizing conflicts through civilian stories. We also discussed social media's influence, evolving language, and ethical reporting strategies. This historical perspective reinforces that, despite changing tools, the enduring values of truth, objectivity, and peace make journalists essential in complex uncovering issues amid sensationalism and clickbait.



Mr. Khalid Khatak

Multimedia Journalist and Founder at Data Stories

In the presentation, Mr. Khatak explored the fiercely competitive digital landscape where clickbait content thrives. This highlighted the dilemma journalists face, balancing the need for clicks and views with maintaining objectivity and credibility, crucial in a sensationalism-driven media environment. While recognizing the importance of staying relevant and engaging audiences online, the of clickbait content allure was acknowledged. This often tempts journalists compromise objectivity, posing a to significant modern media dilemma.
