PRC submitted a publication to "Journal of Interpersonal Violence" titled "Predictors of Intimate Partner Violence in married women of reproductive age: Evidence from Pakistan Demographic Health Survey 2017-2018. The identified demographic, study household, and women empowerment factors that predicted emotional, physical, and sexual violence in ever married women of reproductive ages (15-49 years, n = 3965) in Pakistan by performing secondary analysis on Pakistan Demographic and Health Survey, 2017-18. The analysis found that 30.2% women experienced emotional, 24.1% reported less severe physical, 6.5% experienced severe physical, and 4.3% experienced sexual violence, respectively. The multivariate analysis found that husband's age, education, wealth, and alcohol consumption were significant predictors of intimate partviolence. Additionally, womens' age, education, and number of children also significantly predicted intimate partner violence. With respect to empowerment variables, ownership of house was a significant predictor of less severe physical violence, ownership of property significantly predicted emotional violence, and autonomy in household purchase decisions was signifi-

cantly related to severe physical violence. The control on husband's income as a measure of empowerment significantly predicted all four types of intimate partner violence. The beliefs in patriarchy also turned out to be an important factor in determining emotional and less severe physical violence.

Population Facts Statistics by Punjab Safe City Authority and Punjab Unified Communication Response reveal that 13478 calls reporting domestic violence were received from Lahore only between January and May 2020. Calls reporting domestic violence increased from 2853 in March to 3079 in April to 3090 in May

August 2020

PRC organized a second webinar tended by Dr. James Tebbe with Center for Learning and Teaching (CLT) in the second week of August and the topic was "Small together makes big". Dr. Mahmood Khalid, a Senior Research Economist in the Macroeconomics section and an associate in Fiscal Policy and Governance Center of Pakistan Institute of Development Economics (PIDE) Islamabad, was the guest speaker for this webinar. Dr. Mahmood talked about tax reforms from a growth inclusive perspective and discussed plausible reforms required in tax collection framework of Pakistan. The webinar was at-

Pakistan Economic Survey 2020

- Pakistan's loans increased to Rs 25000 billion and if total debts and liabilities were cumulated, the amount increases to Rs 30000 billion
- Growth recorded at -0.4 percent during the fiscal vear 2019-20
- Fiscal deficit reduced to 4.0 percent of GDP during July-March 2020
- Current account deficit reduced by 71% during July-**April 2020**
