The Dean's Message

This past year has been one of remarkable growth and achievement for the Department of Education. A standout milestone is the continued advancement of our MPhil (Education) program, which is set to welcome its fifth cohort in Fall 2025. The program has met its enrollment targets while enhancing its curriculum with the integration of AI tools and experiential, out-of-class learning experiences.

Another major success has been the completion of the NECTE accreditation process—a truly collaborative effort by the entire faculty. In addition, the creation of a dedicated professional development unit, headed by a coordinator, has allowed us to offer impactful CPD sessions featuring both local and international experts.

Our partnership with Light of Hope School has grown stronger this year. We supported the launch of a new campus, implemented a comprehensive professional development plan, and collaborated on academic initiatives. A special highlight was the participation of Light of Hope students in the opening ceremony of our 3rd International Conference on Education. The conference featured presentations by 29 MPhil students and over 50 scholars from national and international institutions, while more than 150 teachers from local schools, that includes 49 teachers from Light of Hope, benefited from professional workshops led by our department.

In terms of research, our faculty made meaningful contributions through both publications and conference presentations, with one member honored with a best paper award. Additionally, one faculty member participated in scholarly activity in Germany and six faculty members took part in global collaborative teaching efforts through the GLCA, which brought valuable international perspectives into the classroom.

The 3rd International Conference on Shaping Equitable Education: Inclusion, Innovation & Impact.

The Department of Education at Forman Christian College (A Chartered University) has had a vibrant and impactful year, marked by a successful 3rd International Education Conference. This year's conference, held on February 21st and 22nd, 2025, focused on the crucial theme of "Shaping Equitable Education: Inclusion, Innovation & Impact." The Conference brought together educators, researchers, policymakers, and graduate students representing both the private and the public sector universities from Pakistan and abroad, engaging in meaningful dialogue around contemporary challenges and innovations in education. This event underscored FCCU's commitment to fostering global dialogue on educational equity and innovation.

The conference commenced with registration and a joint recitation from the Holy Quran, Holy Bible and The Guru Granth Sahib, reflecting the institution's commitment to interfaith harmony. This was followed by a Welcome Address by Dr. Jonathan S. Addleton, Rector and Chief Patron of the conference, who emphasized the transformative role of education in shaping equitable societies.

NACTE Accreditation

An academic evaluation visit was conducted, led by Mr. Ammar Husnain Khan, under the supervision of the National Accreditation Council for Teacher Education (NACTE) to ensure that institutional and program standards were being met. The evaluation team consisted of esteemed external evaluators Dr Azhar Mahmood, Associate professor and chairperson ELM at IIU, affiliated with Dr Muhammad Idris, Associate professor at Abdul Wali Khan University, Mardan. The evaluation was carried out over two days and involved a thorough review of documentation, infrastructure, and academic practices.

The first day of the visit was dedicated to the examination of standard files prepared by the department. These documents reflected the department's compliance with NACTE standards across various domains including curriculum design, faculty qualifications, assessment practices, and governance structures.

The evaluators were formally briefed about the institution's leadership structure, including the Rector, Vice Rector, and Associate Vice Rector. This briefing highlighted the university's vision, academic mission, and strategic priorities in the field of teacher education.

Following this, interviews were conducted with faculty members. The evaluators sought insight into the academic and infrastructural resources available within the department. Faculty members responded to questions related to curriculum development, research opportunities, teaching practices, and institutional support.

The evaluators also engaged with a group of students from the teacher education program. These students shared their perspectives on the quality of education provided. Key discussion points included the real-life application of course content, teaching effectiveness, learning outcomes, and co-curricular opportunities offered by the department.

The second day of the evaluation focused on classroom observation. Two classes were observed by the evaluators. The observation aimed to assess several critical teaching and learning components.

The evaluators examined student-teacher interaction within the classroom settings, noting the level of student engagement and participation. The instructional methodologies employed by the teachers were also evaluated to determine their effectiveness and relevance to the course objectives. Furthermore, evaluators reviewed the alignment of course content with the standards and its practical applicability. Students' comprehension of the material was gauged through real-time observation and interaction during lessons.

The two-day NACTE evaluation visit provided a comprehensive review of the department's academic and professional standards and department's endeavor to align its BS Education Program with HEC Program guidelines. The evaluators appreciated the transparency and cooperation demonstrated by the department and commended the institution for its efforts toward quality assurance and continuous improvement in teacher education.





STEAM Education Project

The Education Department at FC College collaborated with the Beaconhouse Head Office to form an "Evaluation Committee for STEAM Projects." Within this partnership, The Educators, a project by Beaconhouse, introduced the STEAM Implementation Program for Grade 5 & 6. This innovative endeavor aimed to empower young students to tackle global issues by applying a STEAM approach, specifically addressing the Sustainable Development Goals. From the Education Department, four senior students were chosen to participate in this project due to their expertise in STEM education. This project was led by Mr Ammar Husnain Khan from the department of Education . The students served as integral members of the evaluation committee responsible for assessing project presentation videos submitted by The Educators school campuses, using predefined evaluation criteria. Additionally, they objectively evaluated the projects and compiled detailed observation reports, contributing valuable insights.



This opportunity allowed our students to gain practical experience in evaluating educational programs, significantly enhancing their skills and enriching their professional profiles. Simultaneously, THE EDUCATORS received invaluable feedback from these budding professionals, facilitating ongoing refinement and optimization of their STEAM program.

MPHIL EDUCATION AT FCCU

The Department of Education proudly celebrates the remarkable achievements of its MPhil students, who made a significant mark at the 2025 Education Conference. A total of 8 MPhil scholars showcased their research through poster presentations, while 24 students presented research paper presentations—a testament to their academic depth and research potential.

Among the participants were students from leading national and international universities, yet several of our scholars stood out by securing "Best Paper" awards, earning recognition for their originality, insight, and academic rigor.


OPEN HOUSE 25






Exploring Heritage, History, and Learning: Educational Trips by the Department of Education

In a meaningful blend of classroom learning and real-world exploration, the Department of Education recently organized a series of educational trips to some of Pakistan's most significant historical and cultural landmarks: Katas Raj Temples, Khewra Salt Mines, the historic city of Multan, and Rohtas Fort. These excursions were designed not merely as recreational outings, but as immersive learning experiences aligned with the department's educational objectives of promoting critical thinking, cultural awareness, interdisciplinary learning, and reflective engagement.



Each trip was followed by reflective sessions where students discussed the pedagogical possibilities of site-based education. These experiences empowered future educators to think creatively about how to bring learning to life and promote deeper student engagement. As one student noted, "Visiting these places helped me understand how education can extend beyond the classroom walls and foster a lifelong curiosity about the world."

The Department of Education proudly announces the impactful community service projects undertaken by its undergraduate students. These initiatives, led by Mr. Syed Jaffer Gardezi, focused on educating students from underserved communities about crucial topics such as environmental conservation, health and hygiene practices, and the long-term importance of education.

The projects centered on empowering students with knowledge to make informed decisions and lead healthier lives, all while encouraging them to be stewards of the environment. Students also engaged in interactive workshops, creating a dynamic learning environment that fostered curiosity and engagement among children.

The Department of Education looks forward to further initiatives reaffirming its commitment to social responsibility and educational empowerment.





Classroom Activities Highlight Educational Foundations:

Students engaged in a dynamic classroom activity centered on the foundations of education, exploring various educational eras through group discussions and poster presentations. The aim was to understand how education has evolved over time, including changes in student-teacher relationships, classroom practices, and institutional visions.



Awareness campaigns were conducted on educational psychology, with a focus on cognitive development. Students examined key theories by psychologists such as Piaget and Erik Erikson, and applied them through creative activities including mind games and skits tailored to different developmental stages of children.

The session also included interactive elements like a Q&A round and role-plays based on different intelligence domains, inspired by Howard Gardner's theory. These activities helped students connect theoretical knowledge with real-life contexts.

A curriculum project wrapped up the initiative, where students developed a curriculum for a selected class level. They created standards, benchmarks, and Student Learning Outcomes (SLOs), along with resource books tailored to meet those outcomes.





The hands-on approach encouraged active participation and deepened understanding of educational principles in a meaningful and engaging way.



EFFECTIVE USE OF CLASSROOM TIME


The workshop titled Effective Use of Classroom Time, facilitated by Ms. Syeda Khadija Burhan, focused on enhancing instructional efficiency through practical, research-based strategies. Participants explored common time-management challenges in classrooms, such as disorganized plans and inefficient transitions, which often lead to significant lost learning time. Through an interactive schedule revision activity, educators exchanged and collaboratively improved their classroom routines, identifying areas to streamline and optimize daily operations.

Key strategies highlighted during the session included prioritizing high-impact tasks, developing consistent routines, encouraging student self-management, and planning for unforeseen interruptions. Participants also examined the concept of the "three faces of time"—Primary, Secondary, and Tertiary Time—to better align activities with students' energy and focus levels. The session concluded with a strong emphasis on using time efficiently to enhance student learning and reduce teacher stress, equipping attendees with actionable insights for immediate application.

INTERVENTION TALK

As part of the Inclusive Education course, a guest speaker session titled "How Society Looks at Disability?" was organized with the support of Ms. Khadija Burhan. The session featured Ms. Hamail Ijaz, a practicing clinical psychologist and speech therapist who currently heads the Emotional Health Program at Lahore's leading school systems and an MPhil Education scholar at FCCU, engaged students in a critical discussion about how disability is perceived and addressed in our society. The talk provided a platform for students to reflect on societal biases and explore ways to foster a more inclusive environment for individuals with disabilities

During the session, Ms. Ijaz emphasized how some organizations are actively working to ensure that students with disabilities are given opportunities to thrive and become contributing members of society. She highlighted the significant progress made, while also acknowledging the work that still needs to be done to shift societal attitudes. The discussion underscored the importance of continuing advocacy, education, and policy change to better support children with disabilities in managing their





COMPASSIONATE DISCIPLINING AND BIAS FREE TEACHING

Led by Ms. Aqdus Aslam and Ms. Khadija Burhan from the Department of Education in collaboration with the Office of Research, Innovation and Commercialization for Project EmotiZen (for the Millennium Fellowship 2024), the session aimed to promote inclusive teaching practices and strengthen student-teacher relationships within FCCU classrooms.

CROCHET WORKSHOP

The Forman Sociological Society successfully organized a comprehensive crochet workshop that brought together 70 enthusiastic participants. All necessary materials, including yarn and crochet kits, were provided by the organizing team, with resources curated by Ms. Khadija and seven dedicated student volunteers.

In the concluding session, Dr. Jaffree offered insightful commentary on the psychological and social benefits of crocheting, emphasizing its role in promoting mental well-being and community engagement. The workshop also featured a curated display of crochet projects completed by the organizers, reflecting a broad spectrum of skill levels.
